Wardens' Letter

February 1, 2014

Hello Fellow Parishioners:

As we write this letter, not only we here in New York, but others around the country, including the South, are encountering bitter cold temperatures and an inordinate amount of precipitation in all forms. We hope that you and yours are faring well and keeping warm.

As we pray for your safety and warmth, we also ask that you please keep in your prayers those who are not accustomed to or prepared for such temperature abnormalities. Also, PLEASE remember that the food pantry has come to rely on our support; supplies are at an all time low. Please do what you can to add to the baskets in the rear of the Church. Imagine the smiles of joy and thanks of those families who receive a bounty of plenty from us. It really does not take much - just another minute in the pasta, soup or cereal aisles to pick up a few extras for those in need and a drop off at Christ Church. Our very own special volunteers manage the actual delivery to the Food Pantry.

On the topic of feeding the needy, this Saturday, February 8th, youth from various churches, including our very own, will be participating in a Leadership Lab entitled: **The Reality of Hunger: Second Annual Youth Leadership Lab.**

The program will focus on the important and very real issue of hunger in America and how we, as Christians, can make a positive and significant impact, regardless of age. The program will run from 9am – 3pm at The Congregational Church, 1845 Northern Boulevard, Manhasset, and will include interactive workshops, creative activities, a documentary film (with popcorn!) and a service project creating over 500 lunches for The INN (Interfaith Nutrition Network). THE ANNUAL MEETING

2014 has already proven to be a busy and productive time for Christ Church. As we moved into February, we moved into the next cycle for the Church calendar with the Annual Meeting, which took place on February 2nd. Efforts were made to not only publicize this meeting but to encourage parishioners through individual contact by Vestry members to attend. We were pleased to see more 50 in attendance at the meeting. Written materials were also distributed days in advance of the meeting with the hope of sparking interest in and dialogue at the meeting. And so they did – the meeting proved to be an interactive one with reports made and questions asked and answered.

At the Annual Meeting, we heard highlights not only from the various committees for which written reports were distributed, but we also heard from Andy Phillips about the status of the Rector search; Ariana Tadler Paterson about the progress being made on our "under construction" Parish House, with details about the actual layout of the space, and anticipated furnishing needs; and Tom Allen about the current financial status of the Church and what we can anticipate in the future insofar as expenses and the need to engage in solid fundraising to ensure that our Church thrives

well into the future.

Parishioners were also reminded and positive discussion ensued about Church assignments. Specifically, all who serve are asked to please be respectful and responsible in carrying out their Church assignments. Parishioners who are assigned to serve on a particular Sunday are responsible for making arrangements for substitutes, by contacting other parishioners to serve, if they themselves cannot serve. Please do not ask the Church Office to make such arrangements.

- If you are assigned to *Hospitality (Coffee Hour)* for a particular Sunday, and you are unable to serve that Sunday, please make arrangements to swap with another parishioner and then notify both Donna, our Church Secretary, and Holly Melichar, Chair of Fellowship.
- If you are assigned as an Usher or Oblation Bearer, please do make it a point to be early to Church to greet parishioners; if you are unable to serve, please make arrangements to swap with another parishioner.
- If you or your child is assigned to serve on the altar in any capacity, please do make it a point to arrive at Church and be present in the Sacristy by no later than 9:45am to ensure proper time for robing and coordinating with Father Charlie Colwell. Tardiness of those who are to serve on the altar delays the start of the service. We ask that you please be mindful of being on time. If you or your child cannot serve on the assigned Sunday, please make arrangements to swap with another parishioner, and then advise Donna, our Church Secretary, and Valerie Siener, who works hard to create and manage the schedule.

Worthy of particular note were the following reports:

- Diana Tadler, Directress of the Altar Guild, reported that funds for altar flowers are down significantly. Historically, the Altar Guild has been a self-sustaining program that allows for the beautiful flowers on Sundays and, of course, the beautiful decorations on our highest holy days. Funds for these provisions come from donations made by parishioners separate and apart from their Annual Pledge. We encourage you to contact Diana Tadler about making a donation for flowers for a particular Sunday in memory of or thanks for loved ones or to celebrate a particular occasion. General donations may also be made and those funds will be used to provide for flowers and decorations throughout the year.
- Andrew Yeargin, our Organist and Choirmaster, also reported on our various music programs, the details of which can be found in his written report. But worthy of highlight here is our Schola Cantorum program which provides special opportunities to youth (grades 9-12) to learn and participate with the Chancel Choir. In exchange for a high level of commitment to the Church's Music Program, each choral scholar is offered a scholarship from the Church upon graduation from high school. We have one choral scholar expected to graduate from high school in June who has been an active participant in the program and who has made our Sunday music extra special. This program is also a self-sustaining program based on donations from parishioners. Andrew made an appeal to the parish to give to the Church's Schola Cantorum Fund, which makes it possible for Christ Church to grant scholarships to teenagers who give their time and skill to enrich the music program as choral scholars.

We also installed our new Vestry members:

And we recognized and thanked Pattie Gallatin for her service on the Vestry and as our fearless leader; and Liz Giacoma for her service on the Vestry and as Co-Chair of Hospitality.

STEWARDSHIP

To date, we have received 54 Pledges/ Trust gifts from the 85 pledging families, or 65% of the total. However, we continue to receive pledges. As we close out the Stewardship Campaign, based on pledges received, we should achieve the Stewardship budget estimate. A personal follow up effort to families who had not yet pledged, will continue.

We close this letter with an additional exultant thank you, expressed with the utmost gratitude, to Senior Warden Pattie Gallatin, who has steered our Vestry and Christ Church over the past two years during a time of important transition with grace and unfaltering effort.

A Message from our Director of Spiritual Formation

Faith as an Epic Adventure

"We are all wired for an epic myth." - C.S. Lewis

I just returned from a three day Christian Formation conference in Washington D.C., where hundreds of spiritual leaders from around the country came together to talk about reshaping the way we create faith-based programming. As the title of the conference indicates, we're looking for a bold new approach: *The Once and Future Church: Forming Faith as an Epic Adventure.*

In today's world, people of all ages are longing for epic adventures. Advertising campaigns and reality TV spend big money promoting exotic vacations, extreme sports and once-in-a-lifetime experiences. People use social networking platforms to share every aspect of their lives, transforming the ordinary into a connected global story. One billion people and counting enter the world of *Angry Birds* on a regular basis to play in an exciting, imaginary world. Even ordering a cup of coffee at Starbucks has become the most personal, adventurous and satisfying thing that it can be. Everywhere we turn, we find the desire to experience the extraordinary.

At a time when religion can range from being politically incorrect to a last priority, how can we make our spiritual journey equally extraordinary? How can we teach our children that baptism is the beginning of a hero's journey in an unending story with God? What would it be like to open the bible and greet all of the characters, stories, prayers, hopes and dreams as THE paramount epic adventure of our life?

For inspiration, I have begun looking at societal epic adventures to see how they can connect us in a deeper, more meaningful way. One of my favorites: JK Rowling, author of the outrageously successful Harry Potter series, says that there are two scripture passages that sum up the entire reason for her books. They are carved on the tombstones of two wizards. The first: Where your treasure is, there your heart will be also. – Matthew 6:21. The second: The last enemy that shall be defeated is death. –1 Corinthians 15:26. In the midst of Harry's improbable adventure, he is searching to answer the exact same questions we are on our Christian journey: What are you seeking? and Do you know that death will be defeated? What would happen if we acted with the same courage, commitment and curiosity as Harry? Imagine the possibilities!

I believe we have already begun to form faith as an epic adventure at our church. I see this in the ways people share at retreats: the hunger for understanding the Bible; the energy that our children exhibit when leading us in worship; the passion for service and community outreach; and the joy people share when greeting each other on Sundays. Clearly, we are on the right track. Clearly, we have the ability to find a bold new approach to faith, one that will put societal attempts at epic adventure to shame.

What type of epic adventures do you crave? How can they inspire your Christian journey? Get in touch with me to share your story. I'll be eager to hear and perhaps play a small part in your epic adventure!
